I would ask that we please DO NOT bring items into the club house that are bare root plants and still have dirt on them, bromeliads filled with water in their tanks or leaf debris (please empty them outside or at home). Please do not place bromeliads or other items on the brand new pool table. And please clean up any debris from plants that you may have brought to the meeting for show and tell, received as a gift or won in the raffle. We love our meeting location and want to

Back to Basics - Part 2

This is the time of year that you should be closely inspecting your bromeliad collection and planning on separating those pups that formed through the Winter months (I know-"what Winter?" this was indeed, a mild one!) but until now were just too small to take a chance on removing from the parent plant. Well, now they're half to two-thirds the size of the parent (one of those 'rules of thumb' for determining when to remove pups) and you've got your clippers in one hand, the unpotted parent with the pup(s) attached in the other and you are looking around for just the right pot for that new pup...aaaannnd ...what pot should that be?

Let's start with your choice of materials. Most gardeners tend to be one or the other of two types:

- 1. Those that over-water their plants or
- 2. Those that under-water their plants. Notice that I didn't include a third category:
- 3. Those that water *just right*. If you think you belong in this category read no further. It will only confuse you!

If you think you may be one that overwaters, either because the sprinklers hit that part of your yard a little too frequently or your plants are in a very damp part of your yard this can be a problem for your bromeliads. Remember that many of these plants are epiphytic, have very rudimentary root systems, and just can't handle being wet all of the time. In this situation you may want to consider using terra cotta or clay pots. On the down-side, these may cost a little more than plastic pots, but these pots are somewhat porous and allow water to "wick" through them and away from the potting media. In the hot Summer weather this wicking action can actually serve to provide a cooling effect on the pot and plant in it and, as a bonus, the extra weight that terra cotta provides may help keep your plants upright in a wind storm.



Rack of clay pots in potting area in Selby Gardens you are a chronic *under-waterer*, plants potted in terra cotta pots will dry out quicker than those in plastic pots with the result that in our dry Spring season your potting mix and bromeliads may become severely dessicated. Bromeliads are very forgiving in the care or lack of care that you give them, but they all will show their displeasure with being allowed to get too dry. Plastic pots are a good choice for you since the plastic will retain moisture in the potting mix far longer than the same mix in a clay pot. Plastic pots are relatively inexpensive, far less likely to break when they fall or are pushed off a bench by the family pet and don't discolor like terra cotta when salts leach through the clay and colorful varieties of algae colonize the moist clay surface. Plastic pots come in a variety of colors, but please, let's avoid the purples and yellows - you'll be doing everyone a favor! Regarding colors however, something to keep in mind is that black plastic pots can absorb heat and become quite hot when they are in Florida's noon-day sun so you may want to consider either the standard green or even a white color for your pots if they are in the full sun.

So, now that you've decided on which pot to use, let's take a look at the size of that pot. I once saw a very large Aechmea bracteata, in full bloom potted in a 2" pot and the plant and bloom were both outstanding! Granted, the pot was placed in a series of progressively larger pots to keep it upright, but the point is, it doesn't make a lot of

bromeliad in, as long as it's large enough so that the plant isn't constantly tipping over. It's a different story for the terrestrials! These plants often have large, complex root systems that need some space to properly develop. This is why you often see wonderful examples from the Genus Cryptanthus grown in pots that seem proportionally much larger than you would expect and for those of you who grow bromeliads from the pineapple (Ananas) family, it's best to put these plants in fairly large potryounce activated as such.

OK, now you've got your pot selected, you're ready to separate the pup from the parent plant and it's time to put some potting mix in the pot...oh wait, what kind of mix should you use? You'll have to wait for next month's installment, when we'll take a look at what characteristics a good potting mix should have if it's to be used for bromeliads. That's ok – just put the plant in your empty pot. It will be just fine until next month when we'll also talk about separating bromeliads.

Bi-generic

I thought you might be interested in seeing a photo of the Bi-generic hybrid:

xAndrolaechmea 'Cyclops'



The plant came from our friend Mike Michaelski a few years ago and now has come into bloom – showing the best features of the Androlepis skineri (big and red) and Aechmea luddemanniana (the inflorescence closely resembles this) parents. I don't have many bigenerics, but this one is pretty nice. This plant may seem to closely resemble xAndrolaechmea 'Dean' but has a different pollen parent and that's enough to warrant a unique name.

Volusia County Master Gardener's Faire

April 21st is the date for the Master Gardener's Faire at the Volusia County Fair Grounds in Deland. If you haven't been there before, the address is **3100 E. New York Ave.** in Deland (on State Road 44). If you are travelling from the East – take I-4 to the State Road 44 exit in Deland. Head East on SR44 and you will see the fairgrounds on your right. As we've noted before, this is a half-day sale - from 8:30am to Noon only so don't be late! We'll be looking for everyone to pitch in and help out – we need your spare plants to sell and we need help staffing the sales booth. This is our one fund-raiser for the year, so let's make it a success. Plants need to be priced to the nearest whole

dollar (for example: no \$4.49 plants – they're either \$4 or they're \$5, you decide!) clean, free of scale, clearly labeled and, if you wish to sell your plants – include your name on the price tag. As in past years, if you would like to make a little money to offset the cost of buying plants, mix, and pots (and this is an easy way to do it), 80% of the proceeds go to the owner of the plant and 20% to the club...or, if you are feeling charitable – donate the total amount of the proceeds to the club. It will be gratefully accepted! For those of you helping in the sales area, here's how you do it – take the price tag only from each plant that a customer wishes to buy. Add the total amount from the tags for each customer – this is the total that they need to pay. Give the customer a receipt indicating the total number of bromeliads purchased – they will need this to take the plants out the exit gate. It's all pretty simple, but things have a way of getting very hectic when the booth is full of customers buying plants, so don't be afraid to ask for help from the more seasoned (they're not old, they're well-seasoned) sales people in our club! Bring your own chair – there won't be one provided.

Once again, here are the rules for plant sales: <u>Rules for vendors/sales</u>

- 1. The sales chair(s) must be contacted in advance of the event to indicate that you wish to sell at the event.
- 2. All plants intended for sale must be disease, insect, and fungus free. Potting materials should be clean and free of weeds. Wooden mounting pieces should be clean of wood shavings and foreign materials. Any materials not meeting these requirements may be removed from the sales area and returned to the vendor. All water should be removed before placing plants on the sales table.
- 3. Only bromeliads and bromeliadrelated items can be sold.
- 4. All plants, including bare root specimens MUST have two tags

attached in some fashion. One tag will have the full name of the plant and will remain with the plant. The second tag will have the price clearly marked in whole dollar amounts AND the vendor's identification. This will be removed by the cashier at time of sale.

- 5. Patrons can pay by cash or check unless prior arrangements have been made by FECBS for credit card purchases.
- 6. Bromeliad related items such as tshirts, bromeliad crafts and
 applicable art may either have
 one tag with the vendor's number
 and price which will be removed
 by the cashier or two tags, with
 one showing the vendor's number
 and price easily removed by the
 cashier. Please do not staple or
 otherwise permanently attach a
 single tag that can not be
 removed.
- 7. FECBS shall not be responsible for loss of plants or craft items.

 Reasonable efforts will be taken to ensure security. Any items not removed at the end of the sale shall become the property of FECBS.
- 8. All moneys from sales along with tags identifying the owner of materials sold are to be promptly turned over to the Treasurer. Sales receipts will be split with 80% to the vendor and 20% to FECBS.
