### Master Gardener's Plant Faire –

It's time once again for the Volusia County Master Gardener's Plant Faire. Our group has been participating in this event for quite a few years now and I always look forward to this brief (it's only a half day sale!) opportunity to meet the public and acquaint them with the wonderful world of bromeliads. If you have more bromeliads than you know what to do with, this is your chance to bring your surplus plants to the Volusia County fairgrounds (3100 E. New York Avenue, Deland – or, just a stone's throw away from I-4), get some fresh air tending our sales booth, and make a few dollars – that you can spend on the same day purchasing more plants from the many plant vendors who will be selling their wares from 8:30 until noon on Saturday, April 7<sup>th</sup>.

If you plan on bringing plants for sale, we would enjoy your company if you decide to stay, but you are also welcome to simply drop your plants off at our sales booth and we'll take it from there.

The same sales rules apply that we have had in effect for years at all of our sales. These are:

- 1. Plants must be clean and free of any disease or pests. This is important! Any dirty or scale-**

**ridden plants will be rejected and returned to their owners-who will then bear the shame of schlepping them home again.**

- 2. Each plant must have two tags – one of which will have the plant name on it and the other must have your name or initials on it and the price that you wish to sell the plant for.**
- 3. When the plant is sold, the new owner keeps the tag with the name and we keep the tag that says the sales price with your name on it.**

Simple enough, right? It's up to you to set a price (whole dollar amounts only please – no 99¢ specials!) for each of your plants, get the plants to the fair grounds, and pick up any that went unsold at the end of the sale. Those of us who are tending the booth will take care of the rest.

### This month's meeting –

We are in for a treat this month as Terrie Bert presents her "Sun, Sand, and Sea" program. Dr. Terrie Bert is a longstanding member of the Sarasota Bromeliad Society (SBS) and the Caloosahatchee Bromeliad Society and

has held multiple offices in the SBS. She also served the Florida Council of Bromeliad Societies (FCBS) as a representative and officer for eight years and has authored articles for the FCBS Newsletter. For the Bromeliad Society International, she has been a Florida Director, chaired several international committees, judged several shows, and contributed articles to the BSI Journal. Currently she is Curator of the Wally Berg Award of Excellence and a Master Judge. Terrie has given over 150 presentations on bromeliads to numerous U.S. and international bromeliad societies and other groups and to participants at international bromeliad conferences. She cultivates more than 2,500 different bromeliads in about 35 genera. She's won multiple top awards in local bromeliad shows and BSI world conferences. Terrie has a Ph.D. in marine biology and recently retired from her positions as a research scientist for the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission.

The title of her presentation is "Sun, Sand, and Sea: Bromeliads that Rise to the Occasion." We who live in Florida near the

coast always look for plants that can withstand the salt air and bright sun that bathe our homes. Even people who live some distance from the coast can experience these conditions. In this talk, we'll learn about a number of bromeliad species that can withstand high levels of sunlight, salty air, and dry conditions. A surprising number of bromeliad species can tolerate at least two of these three challenging conditions. Want to learn more? Then, plan on attending our April meeting and you can ask all of those bromeliad questions that you have been saving up since Terrie's last visit to FECBS.

### Out and about –



Space in her condominium is understandably limited, but in spite of that FECBS member Charlotte Mueller has made it a point to focus on some of the smaller varieties of bromeliads that are available and sent in this photo of what can

be done with a tiny *Tillandsia ionantha* and a large artistic imagination!

And here is a photo that I had meant to include in last month's newsletter, but several unanticipated problems happened around the time that I was planning on taking the newsletter to the printer and I couldn't retrieve several photos that I had intended to use (and then found that the printer had merged with another company and would no longer be printing our newsletter!. Whew! Some days are just more difficult than others.). I have often been told that members of the Cryptanthus Genus are very cold tender and must be protected whenever temperatures drop much below 40 degrees F. This photo shows that Cryptanthus 'Wild Cherry' had no problem with temperatures at least 10 degrees cooler than that and for several days in a row – protected only by a single layer of frost cloth! Like so many other rules concerning bromeliad culture, there are exceptions to the rule.
