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

The EVIL WEEVIL AUCTION March 20th 2016

12Noon

The location will be different than in other years, but the procedure will be similar. We should arrive at the LCFMGC building to begin setup of tables and chairs about 12noon. Starting at 12PM we need bodies to help in a varie-ty of areas- Setup, record keepers, runners, people to fill out donation tags, holding area keepers and people to show the items and pass out the winners' successful winning stubs.

12:30-1:45PM

We will be accepting donations such as bromeliads, other tropical plants, bromeliad and gardening related items, books and art. Bromeliads should be clean and healthy and appropriately labeled. If you are unsure about the name ask other members for an ID. Certain items will be selected from donations for the SILENT AUCTION. All items will be numbered and labeled and will be displayed until the Auction begins. Please register for your bidding number at this time. **You can not bid in either Auction without a number**.

1:15 PM- 2:15 PM

Refreshment Break

This is the time for review of auction items and submission of bids for Silent Auction items, which will be set up on side tables. Each item will have a bidding sheet for you to write your bidding number and an offer. Bidders can continuously up the bid as they wish. Bidding will continue until the Silent Auction items are <u>randomly selected</u> and sold to the bidder who has bid the highest. Please bear with us, we will still be receiving donations and labeling them until about 1:45PM, so things may look like a mad house!


2:15 PM

We take our seats and the Auction will begin following a brief business meeting and/or announcements from our President. During the Auction, Silent Auction items will be randomly removed and the winner will be announced. Until an item is taken, you may continue to raise your written offer. The auctioneer will with the assistance of those who brought the item or other commentators, describe the item and auction off the items to the highest bidder during the regular Auction. After an item has been won it will be returned to a holding area. You will be given a claim stub with the price you bid and the item's number, immediately after you have won an item.

Conclusion of Auctions

At the completion of the auction you take your claim stubs to the cashiers and pay for your items with <u>cash or check</u>. After you have paid for your items, the claim stubs will need to be shown to the workers in the holding area...so hold on to them. Your items will be handed over to you. We ask that you help us avoid any confusion. We want everybody to get exactly what they have won as quickly as possible without mistakes. Please note that this year we will be using a two part ticket; one part stays with the plant and the winning bidder receives one part immediately after winning the item, which they will need to claim their winnings. This makes it possible for bidders to check out early since you will know exactly what you owe by adding up you stubs; however, we encourage members to stay until the completion of the Auction when we will have several people available to check you out.

Please come to the Auction and have some fun while supporting the CBS and the FCBS with donations and the purchase of items. As in past years, 1/2 of the proceeds after expenses, will be donated to the Florida Council of Bromeliad Societies. We have been generous donors for as long as I can remember. We are acknowledged by the FCBS as their number one Affiliate contributor to the Council's projects including the "Evil Weevil Eradication Program".



Directions to Diane Cornelison's home:

On Business US41 in North Fort Myers, go north to Bayshore Rd (SR78), take a RIGHT.

Go 1.0 miles on Bayshore to Hart Rd/ New Post Road, take a LEFT

Go 1.2 miles on Hart Rd, to Laurel Lane, take a RIGHT

Go 0.4 miles on Laurel Lane to Bartholomew Dr, take a LEFT

Go 1.0 miles on Bartholomew Dr to Payne Lane, take a RIGHT

2507 Payne Lane is on the RIGHT.

These two views of *Cryptanthus fosterianus* 'Elaine' were provided by their grower, Gary Nelson. This cultivar of a well known species was developed over many years to stabilize its variegation. It is also the first cryptanthus to be patented in the United States. These plants can vary significantly in their markings and colors, especially from seasonal cultural factors. I prefer the "winter" colors, where the whites, pastel pinks and greens are more prominent. With the summer light and heat we see more darkening of the colors with near complete loss of the greens.

CBS Minutes for February 21st 2016

Location: Covenant Presbyterian Church at 2439 McGregor Blvd., Fort Myers, FL 33901

Meeting called to order at 1:20 PM. By President Peter Diamond

Workshop: "Landscaping with Bromeliads in a Cactus and Succulent Garden" Presented by: Dr. Jeffrey Joffe

Jeffrey presented a wonderful power point presentation showing how he has used bromeliads in his landscaping at his previous residence and the new one he moved into a couple of years ago. Bromeliads are good to include for the following reasons: 1) Diversity of many genera 2) Sun loving 3) Colorful 4) Textured 5) Xerophilic 6) Generally cold hardy 7) Interesting flowers 8) Low maintenance 9) Requires little space 10) Many look like desert plants 11) Many come from dry areas. *Neoglaziovia variegata* looks like a skinny *Sansevieria* and needs a deep pot as the stolens go under the soil deep and then pop back through the surface with its offset. Other nice bromeliads to include are *Ananas, Deuterochnia, Bromelia, Dykia, Hechtia, Puya, Encholirium, Tillandsia, and Orthophytum.* If you need a dryer area use a raised bed for planting. The color of the planting surface can greatly effect how the landscape looks. Dyckias like 'Cherry Coke' really pop when they are planted in white rocks. Pictures of his landscaping included palms, agave, cycads, cacti and aloes. He pulls weeds by hand and also uses Round-Up which does not seem to effect most of the bromeliads.

Business Meeting called to order at 1:45 PM. by Peter Diamond **Announcements:**

Peter reminded everyone the next meeting will be the auction and April will be the Birthday Party at Diane Cornelison's. Did everyone who does not have email get the reminder postcard that Larry sent? If you have any gardening or bromeliad books that you no longer want please consider donating them to the club's library-see Linda Soter librarian. Larry will send out the schedule for the auction in the March newsletter but in general he ask that volunteers come to set up around 12 noon. From 12:30 to 1:45 they will be accepting donations of nice bromeliads and other plants you yourself would like to have. Related items are also welcomed like books, jewelry, etc. . . . There will be a refreshment break and the Regular auction begins at 2:15 PM. The Silent Auction will run simultaneously and the winning bidders interspersed during the regular auction. If everyone donates one or two nice items it will be a great auction. We take cash or check. Remember half of the proceeds go for research on eradication of the Mexican Bromeliad weevil or "evil weevil" and we keep the other half.

The Birthday Party is on the 3rd Sunday in April at Diane's. Her father Frank was the only bromeliad person in Fort Myers back in the 50's and he was mentioned in the book "The Orchid Thief"

Roger Oskcochuck will be liquidating his bromeliad collection-info to follow in the future. Dale – the master gardeners have a booth at the Lee County Fair and needs one of us to volunteer to give a short program, John Taraska, M.D. volunteered for this. Pete said the Edison Garden Festival was great. March in the Park in Cape Coral will be on March 12th from 9-3 at Jaycee Park, many vendors will be there. We also have for sale every meeting Tilly Tacker, fertilizer and aluminum wire (40ft for \$5.00)- see Betty Ann. Carly reminded those that signed up for the Fakahatchee swamp walk on April 2nd, that they need to meet at 10 AM and that it is \$60.00 per person.

Program: "Tillandsia" Presented by: Bruce McAlpin

Bruce filled in for a speaker who couldn't make it. His interest in tillandsias started 45 years ago when he came to South Florida on vacation from Duke University. Today he brought in two full tables worth of Tillandsias from his green house for his program. Tillandsias are mostly full sun and epiphytic. They can grow from a string or sitting on a block in shade or sun. The color and bloom can depend on the amount of light. Most Tillandsias are cold hardy until it reaches around 32 degrees. He showed many substrates on which they may grow. He often uses the wire closet shelves and hangs these from a hanger in full sun. When he fertilizes he uses about half strength liquid fertilizer about every 3 weeks. He fights the weevil using Imidicloprid and sprays in March and September. Most tillandsias in nature grow hanging in trees or off cliffs, but he passed around a book showing miles of Tillandsia paleaca growing on the desert floor in Peru. He showed us three forms of *Till. usenoides.* Always use non copper wire and hang large long Tillandsias down as they grow in nature, especially the bulbous shaped types to avoid collion of water between the leaves. Till. bulbosa also needs to point down and if it wants it will grow upright by itself. If you don't take the pups off the mother plant they get bigger because they still get nutrition from the mother plant. Small plants can grow sitting in an orchid basket and he sits some just on the concrete blocks in full sun. Plants that grow in rosette form are most primitive and elongated growth is most likely a variety of a primitive rosette species. Some tillandsias look like other species like Till. kirchhoffiana resembles an Alcantarea. And Vriesea hitchcockiana looks like a Tillandsia. He is looking forward to his trip to Terra Del Fuego later this month where he will be looking for some of the southern most growing tillandsias.

Details: The group of 12 people who have previously signed up for the special guided tour will meet in the parking lot at 10AM. You need to provide your own transportation or carpool.


