Out and About:

Bill Hazard sends this pretty picture of his variegated Aechmea mexicana in his yard in Ormond Beach:



We've had an unusual number of Billbergias recently that erupted into their beautiful but

short-lived blooms. This first one is of Billbergia reichardtii. This is a very small species Billbergia (barely 5" tall) that was given to me some time ago by Al Muzzel of Gainesville and somehow or other I either blinked and missed the bloom in past years or it just hadn't bloomed until this January.



This second picture is of Billbergia White Cloud. This plant is also small, but a bit larger than the previous plant. It more than makes up for its small size by its beautiful foliage and inflorescence!

Many people think if bromeliads as being exotic and foreign plants, but they forget that at least 16 different native species of bromeliads (plus two natural hybrids) live right here in Florida. During a recent visit to Reed Canal Park in South Daytona I happened to look up when an airplane flew over and noticed that many of the trees in the park had large clumps of Tillandsia bartramii attached to them.



Tillandsia bartramii on tree trunk in South Daytona Tillandsia bartramii is named in honor of William Bartram, who travelled extensively through Florida in the 1700s and described the flora and fauna that he encountered in his wanderings. This plant is probably the most cold-hardy of the Florida bromeliads and is found more often in the central and northern portions of the state than in south Florida where the majority of the native broms reside. T. bartramii produces a single pink spike, ending in a slightly enlarged bulb that small tubular flowers emerge. T. bartramii may not be the most colorful of the Florida bromeliads, but it is still an eye-catcher when it forms large clumps on trees throughout central and northern Florida.
