Plant Profile – The 'blues' and those great Bullis hybrids



Aechmea 'Del Mar' – it's hard to look away from those vibrant colors as seen in this photo in Calandra Thurrott's front yard.

I noticed that my Aechmea 'Del Mar' had recently come into bloom in my yard. What a great plant! Del Mar is a bit smaller than

the more popular Aechmea 'Blue Tango', which fits my yard much better, but still has that 'eye-popping' inflorescence. Blue is a difficult color to find in much of the plant world. Develop a good strong blue in a flower and the world will beat a path to your door...at least that was the idea behind the currently popular blue phalaenopsis orchids. Beautiful color, but eventually you realize that the color was put there artificially by means of an intense blue dye and find that the next generation of these orchids... not so blue!

So, what about blue colors in the blooms and leaves of some bromeliads? It's tempting to say that those plants have blue genes (blue jeans?) in their makeup, but that would be incorrect. Instead, it's a group of organic compounds (you should have paid better attention in organic chemistry class!) called *anthocyanins* that are responsible for colors ranging from light red to dark red and from pale blue to purple. Depending on how these compounds are chemically bound, varying shades of colors are produced. The combination of hydroxylated and dehydroxylated anthocyanins as well as the level of these compounds present in the plant lead to color development in varying intensities and cause those colors to shift in the spectrum from red to blue and back again. Hit on the right combination and you get very intense blue colors, but no - you can't just add alum or sulfur to the potting mix to change colors of bromeliad blooms from pink to blue like you can with hydrangeas. Things just aren't that simple and many failures were involved before a good, intense blue color was developed in an Aechmea hybrid. Two plants already found in the wild (*species* plants) with blue coloring in their inflorescences are Aechmea *dichlamydea* var. *trinitensis* and Aechmea *fendleri*. Bullis Bromeliads, right here in Florida, took advantage of these plants as a starting point in a hybridization program, culminating with the registration by Patricia

Bullis in 1998 (and the acquisition of a patent on the plants)

for the hybrid Aechmea 'Blue Tango' and, from the same group (grec) of seeds – Aechmea 'Del Mar'.

Aechmea 'Blue Tango' is one of the most sought after of the large Aechmeas and fifteen years after it was first registered, prices continue to be very high for a good specimen of this beautiful plant. I like the somewhat smaller Del Mar, but that's just my preference. If you don't already have one

or both of these great plants in your collection, I suggest that you give them a try – you won't be disappointed!

If you've ever been to Rick's house, you can't help but notice the large and beautiful bromeliads prominently displayed in the front and back yards. He's sent a few pictures of some of these and I've been trying to fit them in the newsletter where space allows. This month I was all set to go to the printer and realized that there were 5 pages to the newsletter this month. Well, 6 pages is almost as cheap to print as 5 since they're double sided, so I thought this is the perfect

opportunity to fit a couple of those photos into the newsletter.

The first is Aechmea 'Peaches and Cream', a cultivar of Aechmea rubens – same great bloom, but instead of the plain green leaves of rubens this plant has a very nice leaf color.
