She is survived by her husband, who unfortunately prior to Kitty developing her injury, experienced a fractured back and is currently receiving therapy. ### Happy Birthday Greetings!

I don't usually broadcast the age of our senior lady friends, even if I knew, but I'm making this exception since it is truly a great accomplishment. On February 8th our own artist in residency, Kiti Wenzel turned 98 years young.

Kiti moved from Philadelphia, Pennsylvania in 1956, where she started her artistic career after graduating from the Moore College of Art and Design. In that City she spent much of her time educating children in the principles of art. In the 1960's she and husband owned and operated a restaurant, art studios and gallery on Fort Myers Beach. After a move to Sarasota,

where she continued her career as a professional artist, she moved back to Fort Myers.

It was in 1981 that Kiti did her first drawing of a bromeliad, *Billbergia pyramidalis*, which was given to her by a friend. In 1985 she joined the CBS and has been intrigued by the wonderful and varied forms of bromeliads ever since.

There are hundreds of her original watercolors and colored pencil drawings of bromeliads adorning homes throughout the World; Kiti's collection of horticultural print greeting cards remain cherished gifts when sent by a friend; and her numerous Art Exhibitions held over the last 4 decades here in Florida were memorable events. Her generosity is well documented by her contributions of her works to many auctions of local and international organizations as well as providing posters and original designs for World Bromeliad Conferences' publications.

The diversity of Kiti's work distinguishes her as a truly exceptional artist and especially as a "botanical" artist who's works will be appreciated for a long, long time. Happy Birthday, Kiti and we pray that you will have many more.

(Editor's note: The front cover of this newsletter shows a reproduction of a collage of bromeliad drawings by Kiti Wenzel entitled "Bromelia katii". The photo on the back page is of *Neoregelia* 'Kiti Wenzel'. This is one of two plants selected from the grex of *Neoregelia johannis* 'Fairchild' X *Neoregelia* 'Meyendorffii' hybridized by Dean Fairchild and named to honor Kiti. The other plant of the Grex is named *Neoregelia* 'Magic Palette', which has mottling of the leaves and a coral coloration of the center. Dean Fairchild has been an admirer of Kiti and her work for over 25 years and owns more than 20 pieces of her art.)

## I Remember When...

This is one of those 'I remember articles'. As I look at my wonderful collection of bromeliad books, good memories come back to me and I think of our (CBS) great library of books.

When I first built our house, my neighbor from across the street came over and planted at my entrance these ugly tubular plants, as a welcome gift for moving into the neighborhood. He thought that my doorway was a little barren. I will back up a little. This was 1970 and Venice was a very, very quiet sleepy town and everyone knew everyone else. This is why I picked it to be my home. OK back to the story. These were ugly tubular spiky things, but I did not want to hurt my neighbor's feelings, so I left them there. I watched in wonder over the next few weeks as these things opened like a rose and the color was amazing.

Well, I had to go in search for what they were. My neighbor called them "Bromeliads". So the search began. No one at the library knew what I was talking about. The Nurseries were no help; we had no Internet. Then one day walking out of K-Mart, on a turn-rack in the garden center was a book called *Bromeliads for Modern Living* by Lou Wilson from Michigan. This became the Bible. This was a new world, an eye opener and all the other superlatives you can think of. My neighbor loaned me a



book titled *Bromeliads in Color and Their Culture* by Victoria Padilla and he started showing me drawings and pictures and talking about his wife's brother, Mulford Foster. But I still had no additional books. I found *Bromeliads in Cultivation* by Bob and Catherine Wilson (1964). It seems no one checked it out so it was expendable, but what a treasure it became to me. The world of Bromeliads began to open up. I met a couple of people at the County Fair in the plant exhibit hall and discovered that they too were fascinated with Bromeliads. The rest is history - the Sarasota Bromeliad Society was born. We were all so hungry for information - along came another book by Victoria Padilla named simply *Bromeliads* (1973). This now became our new bible. Hazel and Ralph Quilhot joined our group. They were growing, to the other SBS members' amazement a LARGE number of Bromeliads and we began to learn from each other. California bromeliad growers along with Mulford Foster and other growers from Florida and Louisiana formed the International Bromeliad Society (1950). Its Journal became another invaluable source of information. It was hard back then knowing so little about these plants to grow them well, but we had great fun and camaraderie learning together.

from the great people - the pioneers of the movement. *Bromeliads* by Walter Richter came out in 1977 and in 1979 we waited for Werner Rauh's book *Bromeliads for Home, Garden and Greenhouse* to be translated to English. We were on the pre-publication list for the *Biology of Bromeliads* by David H. Benzing (1980).

Do not take our library lightly. It is one of the finest collections of available literature on Bromeliads. We now have such wonderful information right in front of us. Quality books are now being written and available by experts from around the World. Please read them, then look at the beautiful photography and be inspired. I would not give up the hard way we had to learn because I was fortunate to meet all the pioneers, but new ones are still coming—take advantage of their knowledge available in books and journals and Enjoy! By the way my first plants were Aechmea fosteriana.
