
Our new meeting place is the Ft. Myers— Lee County Garden Council Building 2166 Virginia Ave. Fort Myers.

September Program

"Florida Bromeliads: A Story of Wind Dispersal and Survival"
Br Dr. Terrie Bert

"All of Florida's native bromeliads have arrived here as wind-dispersed seeds and, luckily for us, belong to families of bromeliads that have no spines. Florida's forests are uniquely adorned with beautiful bromeliads of different forms, including the most unique of all—Spanish moss. But there are other species that can add beauty, color, and a southern appearance to landscape trees. We'll look at all of Florida's native bromeliads and learn about their growing conditions. Maybe you'll decide to add some to your landscape and enrich your yard's diversity."

CBS Meeting Minutes for June 18th, 2017

Location: Fort Myers-Lee County Garden Council Bldg., 2166 Virginia Ave., Fort Myers, FL 33901

Meeting called to order at 1:15 PM. By President Peter Diamond

Attendance total: 44

New members: 0

Guest: 5, Irene Thomsen, Jackie and Larry Mason, Carole and Rich Richtmyer/speakers

Workshop: "Soils" by Cate Peterson and Bruce McAlpin

Cate brought in 4 different bags of potting mix and had people vote on which they would prefer. The potting mix from miracle grow would do the job for most applications with additions of amendments depending on the plant. Hints: (Add a bag of orchid mix to the Timberline product. Avoid fine peat or dusty pumice. Core has salt so leach it out before using. Potting soil that is neutral or slightly acidic will fit most plants). Bruce would add fine pebbles or use silicone gravel (found at Home Depot) if he were to use Miracle grow as the base, to add weight and to help keep the time release fertilizer in place. However, Bruce uses the Farfad 3S for his bromeliads which is 70% peat and 30% perlite & composted pine bark. He adds perlite and a newer fired clay product called Turface which is calcined clay. By the mechanism of charged particles the Turface holds onto the fertilizer longer. He buys this at John Deer dealerships in 50lb bags for around \$17.00. For his terrestrial mix he uses 1part Turface +1 part Farfad 3S + 1 part coarse perlite. Additives Larry

Giroux likes sponge rock/large perlite for terrestrials; also, Aliflor (similar to Turface) or coconut husk chunks for his epiphytic mix. Also used is volcanic rock and Larry will add charcoal especially if the potting mix is being reused. Michaels Bromeliads uses his own mix of 1/3 peat, 1/3 perlite & 1/3 pine chips and adds amendments depending on what the mix is used for. If you contact him he will bring some to the meeting for \$15 per bag. Dale finds that Walmart sells fine grade pine bark which is less expensive to use as an additive. For big potted plants he puts rocks in the bottom, uses big pine bark and then his mix. He finds it convenient to keep his various mixes stored in garbage cans.

Program: "The ABC's of Terrestrial Bromeliads" Presented by Rick & Carole Richtmyer

They presented an extensive power point presentation. Terrestrial bromeliads grow in the ground and absorb nutrients from their roots system. Also some epiphytic bromeliads can grow terrestrially or saxicolously (in or on rocks). He went on to describe and show the following Genera: Ananas 3 species, Bromelia 70 species, Cryptanthus 80 species, Disteganthus 1 species, Fascicularia 1 species, Fernseea 2 species, Lapanthus 3 species, Neoglaziovia 3 species, Ochagavia 4 species, Orthophytum 57 species, Sincoraea 11 species, Brocchinia 20 species, Deuterocohnia 17 species, Dyckia 170 species, Encholirium 34 species, Fosterella 31 species, Hechtia 75 species, Navia 92 species, Pitcairnia 408 species, Puya 225 species. A visit to Huntington Gardens in Los Angeles CA is well worth a visit. Also they had many Bigenerics that were epiphytes, which were treated as terrestrials and grown in pots.

They look their best when they are young pups and middle sized plants. The plants that are big enough to flower usually llooked spotted and a little beat up. Hohenbergia do not need much root space. All are from Brazil and need some protection from the cold. The bulbous shape of the plants may be a way for them to hold water during long dry seasons.

Workshop: "Bromeliads With Outstanding Fruit" by Peter Diamond

Peter gave a wonderful power point presentation showing many genera and subg. of *Aechmeas* which have either fruit (also referred to as seed pods), which are large, have unusual colors, or both. *Bromelia* has someof the larger and showy fruit, but their rosettes take up a lot of space in the landscape. Some can be fermented and turned into a tequila type liquor or other beverage. Tropiflora and Michaels Bromeliads carry a lot of the plants Pete showed in his program. One of the crosses *xPortmea* "Guava Queen" was made by Dale Kammerlohr. Many Aechmeas have the nick names of "Green Monsters" or "Yard Dogs" because of their plain green foliage, but he showed many with unusual fruit that were attractive. *Billbergia brasilliensis* and *Billbergia viridiflora* were also shown.

Business Meeting called to order at 1:52 PM. By Peter Diamond **Announcements:**

Bring back any old sale signs so that Betsy can reuse them. Also if you plan on going to the swamp walk bring money to Carly next month. Vicky gave a report on the Extravaganza in Tampa and said it was the 2nd best in history. Larry said they raised \$5,000 at the auction and the sales area sold out quickly. Terri said she enjoyed the garden tours. Betty Ann said 160 registered and we had 10-12 of our own members participate. Pete showed a sign designed by Larry Giroux to advertise our show and sale this year. Ann Miller suggested the name and theme that was selected "Gardens of the Galaxy" The judged show will be on Friday and Sale on Saturday and Sunday. Dr. Larry would like everyone to choose 3-4 plants now and start grooming them to

enter in the December show. We will be having workshops on how to prepare your plants for show. It will be held at the Shriner's Lodge at 2010 Hanson Street in Fort Myers- more info and maps to come. Peter-Please leave the tables and chairs how you found them and please help clean up the area before you leave and remember the friendship plants at the front door. Only take one to begin with but if there are leftovers at the end of the meeting feel free to take more.

Program: "Epiphytes of Belize: An Inventory" Presented by Bruce Holst of Marie Selby Botanical Gardens in Sarasota FL. He has traveled to Belize 6-7 times in the last few years. This purpose of this trip was to document all epiphytes, utilizing the University of Belize students, improve the condition/ collections of the Natural History storage facility in Belize and increase appreciation of the plants. He presented an extensive power point presentation taking us on 2 armchair expeditions. 62% of Belize plant species are monocots (270 Orchids, 70 Bromeliaceae, and 40 Aroids). Belize has the 2nd largest barrier reef in the world; the country is mostly flat with the highest point approx. 4,500 ft., and 80 different habitat types. The first trip was by heavy tractors to the Nohoch Ch'en sink hole, which is actually a collapsed cave close to 900ft wide and 450 ft. deep. The diversity of epiphytes was greatest at the rim. They pressed and prepared hundreds of new collections which they brought back to the herbarium in Belize and some for Marie Selby Gardens The second trip was to an area in Bladen Nature Preserve for two weeks essentially traveling on foot. They discovered a new sink hole approx. 300 ft. deep and 80-90 ft. wide. They found palms, cycads, orchids and micro orchids but no bromeliads. Results of his trip: Documented nearly 400 Spp. of epiphytes which are about 2/3 of the epiphytes in the country, made rapid field guides for plant identification, found the only species of epiphytic Yucca in this area of Guatemala and Belize, two new species of Pitcarinia and mapped approximately 35,000 records of plants in their native habitats so that next expeditions know where to go for future explorations.
