## JUNE MEETING

### Program:

**Mike Owen**, Park Biologist, Fahkahatchee Strand Preserve State Park, will talk about Florida's native bromeliads. At the park, Mike's duties include hydrological monitoring, surveys for listed plant species, a herbarium collection, wildlife observations including road kill data, vertebrate species list, plant species list, non-native plant removal, and interpretive programs such as swamp walks, slide shows, and guided walks. He has started a *Tillandsia utriculata* monitoring program at the park to document impacts from environmental factors such as the Mexican bromeliad weevil, hurricanes, droughts, and frost events. He is currently tracking about 1,000 specimens of *Til. utriculata* and plans to document annual winter survival and spring seed production.

### Annual Bromeliad Auction

The FWCBS Annual Bromeliad Auction held in lieu of the May meeting was well attended and generated the third highest revenues for an auction to date. Members were generous with both plant donations and bids. Linda and Dennis Cathcart (TropiFlora Nursery), Harry Luther (Marie Selby Gardens), and Donna and Michael Kiehl (Michael's Bromeliads) donated plants from their collections. Helga Tarver organized and sorted plants, assigning most to the Live Auction and some to the Silent Auction. Steve Littlefield donated a hand-painted block print of *Til. Bulbosa*, which generated lively bidding and ultimately brought the highest bid of the night.

The Live Auction was spirited, thanks to auctioneers who worked hard to get maximum bids from the bidders. Working as a pair, Alton Lee described the plant for auction and Kathy Risley was persistent in prompting the group for bids. Barret Bassick did a noteworthy solo job as auctioneer, both describing plants and coaxing bids. Runners who showed and delivered the plants included Kathy Lockwood, Judy Lund, and Susan Sousa. Cashiers Wilma Murphy and Sharon Philyaw assigned Bid Numbers and accurately tracked the bids. Chip Hill, the third cashier, helped tally the bid totals and collect the money. The Silent Auction, organized by Helga Tarver, had nine plants that brought a lot of interest from bidders.

Janet Bankhead and her team set up a bountiful setting of food on the refreshment table and she thanks everyone who contributed food to it. She received many comments about the delicious offerings.
