LAST MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

Program

In a timely presentation, Alton Lee shared once again his tips on helping our bromeliads survive the coming winter cold. This editor was away and did not attend the meeting, and the summary notes below are based on information provided by Alton and from a previous talk he gave on the same subject. We have a number of new members who will no doubt be grateful for this information (and some of us 'seniors' like being reminded).

- Learn to be your own weather forecaster. Observe and get familiar with the regular winter patterns.
- After a front moves through, the coldest part of the day is typically just before dawn and on the second day and night. Any day the temperature fails to reach 60 degrees offers at least a potential chance for a freeze that night.
- Learn the microclimates in your garden and keep notes about them. Monitor these areas with any one of a variety of thermometers.
- Have a list of your tenderest and most special plants and a chart that shows you where they are so you can rescue/ protect them first.
- Cover plants in the landscape with proper materials such as frost cloth, sheets, towels, and/or plastic. (Caution: don't let plastic covers touch plants.) Weigh down the covers so wind and cold do not get under them and they do not blow away. For anchors, use items readily available around the house such as bricks, rocks, paint cans, and anchors for camping tents. Holiday lights placed under the covers can be used as a heat source.

- If the day turns hot and/or rainy, remove covers other than frost cloth. Frost cloth breathes, is fast drying, and admits filtered sun, so it can be left on plants during the day.
- Supplies need not be expensive. Many can be found at thrift shops and garage sales, and most can be used around the house for other purposes.
- If the cold is too severe to depend on outside covering protection for your plants, move whatever you can into a heated space. Inside is all right for short periods of time but if cold lingers, plants will need good air circulation, moisture, and a light source. Keep the plants well spaced to promote air circulation. To add moisture to the air, water the plants directly, place water in open containers among the plants, and/or place plants on trays of wet rocks. To supplement light, use an electric shop light, and for heat, use small heat lamps and/or strings of holiday lights.
- While plants do not feel a wind chill the same way people do, wind can increase moisture evaporation from plant surfaces and soil, which reduces water available to the plants.
- After cold weather, be patient with plants that appear damaged because they might rebound in the spring or summer. And even if they do not look good, they could still produce pups.
